

## SURVEY NO. 2 1 4 3 7 (continued)

Main Street and the Plaza with only a single tie to Block 2 on the 1888 Map to the southwest corner of Lot 1 from the southeast corner of Lot 9, Block 1. I utilized ties to Lot 9 from monuments established by Everett Swain in Survey No. 16742 and run plat record easterly 134.7 feet from said corner along the northerly line of the Chautauqua tract described in Deed Record Volume 155, Page 97 and thence northeasterly to intersect Main Street for the northwest corner of Lot 1, being 30 feet at plat record right angles from centerline. I held record distance of 128 feet frontage along Main Street to the angle point 8.00 feet easterly from the northeast corner of Lot 3, thence southeasterly along Main to intersect the previously determined northwesterly line of Pioneer Street and hit it within 0.20 feet of plat and deed records.

The south line of Block 2 was not quite so simple. The above referenced Chautauqua tract runs east along the south line of Block 2 and then meandering southerly back around to Pioneers Street and eventually to the point of beginning but the figure does not close by 13 feet. It also does not fit well at all with other deed calls between Block 2 and Pioneer Street. To resolve this I go back to McCall's 1888 Map and hold the plat record call of east 137 feet which lines up exactly with the westerly wall line of the Pioneer Building, therefore I hold that position for the southwest corner of Lot 1. By projecting that bearing further easterly to the easterly line of Lot 3, I find that matches better with deed calls for the surrounding properties than holding the Chautauqua tract record figure. When I add the 2.3 foot difference between the first call from the southeast corner of said Lot 9 to the Chautauqua tract distance of 134.7 feet to match McCalls 137 foot distance, then the record figure of the Chautauqua tract fits very well with the surrounding deed calls, as well as the right of way of Pioneer Street which I elect to hold for position. This resolution also fits well with the existing improvements.

BASIS OF BEARING: The Basis of Bearing is the true meridian at the North-South centerline of Section 9, as derived from the NOAA net established in 1968. The referenced bearing for this survey is the centerline of East Main Street having a record plat bearing of North 55°15'35" West per Survey No. 19206 on file in the office of the Jackson County Surveyor.

## SURVEY NARRATIVE TO COMPLY WITH PARAGRAPH 209.250 OREGON REVISED STATUTES

**SURVEY FOR:** Steve Sachs, Michael Donovan,

Oregon Shakespeare Festival 38 & 50 East Main Street Ashland, Oregon 97520

LOCATION: Northwest Quarter of Section 9 in Township 39 South, Range 1

East of the Willamette Meridian in Jackson County, Oregon.

PURPOSE: To survey and monument those tracts of land described within

Instrument No. 94-01091 and 94-11143 of the Official Records in Jackson County, Oregon, for condominium conversion projects.

**PROCEDURE:** Utilizing an electronic Leica TCRP 1203 robotic total station with

Utilizing an electronic Leica TCRP 1203 robotic total station with ranging prisms in conjunction with survey control previously established by this office during the performance of Survey No.

19206, 19313, 20123 & 21234, I survey the lands as shown.

The subject properties lie within Lots 1, 2 & 3 of Block 2, City of Ashland adjacent to the historic downtown plaza, Lithia Park and the Chautauqua Association property now leased by the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. The survey history is this portion of town has a troubled past, with numerous original downtown area plats having been vacated for various reasons from survey inaccuracies to a devastating fire in 1879 which destroyed evidence of existing lots and land boundaries. In 1888 city surveyor M.L. McCall meticulously compiled a large mosaic of the town at that time locating original stone monuments for street right-of-ways and city blocks and completed a large linen map with remarkable accuracy for that period which the Ashland City Council which was accepted and adopted on November 5, 1888 as the Official Map of the City of Ashland. The subject property deeds make calls and references to Block 2 which in the past has had little need for surveyed boundaries because of the occupation of historic buildings constructed in the late 1800's. This block was very challenging to survey for the condominium projects with no original monumention surviving except the buildings themselves and historic record data on stones set as centerline monuments that are unrecoverable today, if even existing.

During the performance of Survey No. 19206 an extensive retracement of Main Street was undertaken which included Oak Street, Pioneer Street, Hargadine Street, Lithia Way (formerly "C" Street) and Winburn Way which when pieced together, fit remarkably well with the 1888 survey record. Block 2 is fronted by
