





Survey Narrative to comply with ORS 209.250 Oregon State Law and Amendments.

For: John L. Gregory, Gold Hill, Oregon

Purpose: The initial purpose of this survey was to show boundaries of parcels of land for sale purposes and making of descriptions.

Procedure: Traverse was started from a point on the Township line common to Sec. 35 T. 36 S.R. 4 W. and Sec. 2 T. 37 S.R. 4 W. of W.M.. This point was on the Township line 10 Feet West of the center line of the traveled Fooths Creek County Road and being 127.8 feet East of the 3/4" pipe monument marking the 1/4 section corner common to the sections. Traverse was then run North and South on tangents parallel to the center line of the road. A line was run East on the Township line to the Re-established Section corner of the two sections, corner marked by a spike in a stump, and with bearing trees was used as an East Bearing assumed for traverses run on this survey.

A 3/4" pipe was found on this line at distance shown on the map. Traverse South was run to tie with a 3/4" pipe marking the Northwest corner of Survey #906 and #907, and line then run East on line of that survey and extended to East line of this survey. Line was then run South from the East point on Township line for closure, setting points on lot corners between.

Running North on traverse along the road was to a point on East and West Fence with 3/4" pipe on east road line. Fence line extended West to Creek from West line of a Warehouse site described in Vol. 248, Pages 537-539. Fence line corresponded in distance to records. North line East of Fooths Creek Road was determined by deed records and as shown.

Traverse was run North on Fooths Creek Road and then East to East line of tract and South on East line to the Township line and pins set on East line for parcel corners.

All lines for parcels West of Fooths Creek Road were set East and West, parallel to the Township line, except as otherwise shown, beginning at the apparent road right-of-way line and to the East bank of Fooths Creek. Property was described as extending to the center line of Fooths Creek, which is indeterminate.
