Sections 23, 24 and 26, Township 40 South, Range 1 East, Willamette Meridian, Jackson County, Oregon.

BASIS OF BEARING:

Solar observation utilized for Record of Survey No. 9015.

PURPOSE:

To reestablish the North one-quarter and South one-quarter corners of Section 26; and to monument the Pacific Crest Trail No. 2000 right-of-way limits at the property line intersections along the trail through Sections 23, 24 and 26.

PROCEDURE:

Prior to commencement of this survey an investigation of the controlling corners along the North and South lines of Section 26 was made. The Northwest, Northeast, Southwest and Southeast section corners of Section 26 had been remonumented from original evidence by the Bureau of Land Management, Division of Cadastral Surveys.

Numerous searches have been made for evidence of the missing North and South one-quarter corners of Section 26. A location poster found along the Mt. Ashland access road indicated that a Mr. Duyson and Mr. McGinty made an approximate tie to the North one-quarter corner of Section 26 in 1953. A telephone call to Mr. Hugh McGinty revealed that he and Mr. Duyson had run a compass line along the North line of Section 26 in 1953 and that they had made a diligent search for the missing one-quarter corner without success.

A corner information card obtained from the Klamath National Forest revealed that in 1932 Mr. Sargent and Mr. Bower found the bearing trees for the South one-quarter corner of Section 26. The report stated they found the bearing trees in very poor condition. No action was taken to perpetuate the corner and, in subsequent years, the area has been disturbed by numerous logging activities. There is also evidence of previous corner search activities in the area.

With the required controlling corners identified, I performed a series of closed survey loops, tying verified controlling corners and topographic calls to part of a closed traverse. From this data search areas were determined for the missing one-quarter corners. After a diligent search of both areas, I was unable to locate any evidence of the missing North or South one-quarter corners of Section 26. I therefore reestablish both corners by proportionate measure as shown on the attached Record of Survey map.

With the required controlling corners identified or reestablished by this survey, I performed a traverse of the centerline of the Pacific Crest Trail No. 2000 from a point on the East boundary of Section 24 westerly to the West boundary of Section 23, tying the traverse of the trail to controlling
